GETTING STARTED

STORY BACKGROUND

We will be looking at this section of Ephesians for two weeks. This week's discussion will focus on the role of the bride, saving discussion of the role of the husband for next week.

Ephesians 5:17-6:9 teaches the proper Christian response of submission to one another. As a community of believers, husbands and wives, parents and children, masters and slaves, they all submit to each other in different ways according to their circumstances. For children and slaves, their subordination is described in terms of obedience. For husbands and wives, the Greek term used for submission describes voluntary submission to a proper authority.

Paul states that wives should voluntarily place themselves under the authority of their husbands (verses 18-24). For women this tends to raise questions such as, "What if I can't trust his leading", or "What if I completely disagree with his decisions?" As a preemptive reassurance, Paul uses the illustration of the Church's submission to Christ. This submission rests on an interactive relationship based on Christ's sacrificial love, intimate personal knowledge, and care for our best interests and needs. It is a relationship of deep trust. For this reason, Paul's major emphasis in this passage is not on the submission of wives, but on the duty of those who are in authority.

HEAD LEVEL: These questions help us to examine what the Word tells us.

- How is submission an act of faith in Jesus Christ?
- Why does submission sometimes feel like a negative thing? List some ways Christians are expected to voluntarily submit?



HANDS LEVEL: These questions help us commit to a next step and live it out in our everyday lives.

- Describe a time you were blessed because you voluntarily submitted to authority.
- Do you struggle with submission to a particular authority figure? How can your group be praying for you?
